#### Blues' college

A group of Ipswich Town Football Club academy players have just completed an education programme with Easton and Otley College.

The college and the football club have worked together for a number of years to ensure that every youngster who plays with the Blues from the age of 16 gets not only football advice but life skills and qualifications.

In the early years of working together, the college used to offer cooking skills to players to help them get used to living away from home for the first time in their lives.

However, since 2005, the educational programme that the college and the club offers trainees has expanded.

Matt Clarke is the head of education and welfare at the club.

He said, "We have between 22 and 24 scholars at any one time and the reality is that only a very small percentage of those people will make it as a professional footballer.

"Whilst at the club we teach the players all sorts of skills and have worked closely with the League Football Education and the college to ensure the

programme continues to deliver the results we require.

"In fact, this year, we decided to set higher boundaries in terms of results and the scholars have really stepped up to the mark. We are keen to keep the contract going – the relationship we have with the college is good – it's been going a number of years in one guise or another and I've been very pleased with the tutors this year."



One of those tutors is Christina McAuley. She said: "I've worked in the role for 18 months and help the scholars with their units. We try and link in what we teach them with what they do as a footballer.

"Everything we are doing is aimed at helping them become more rounded individuals and give them additional skills in case the football side of things doesn't work out." Mr Clarke added: "It's one of the hardest things in the world to tell these trainees that they haven't been offered more terms. This is where we come in and we create an exit strategy offering not just a plan B, but a plan C and D in many cases."
